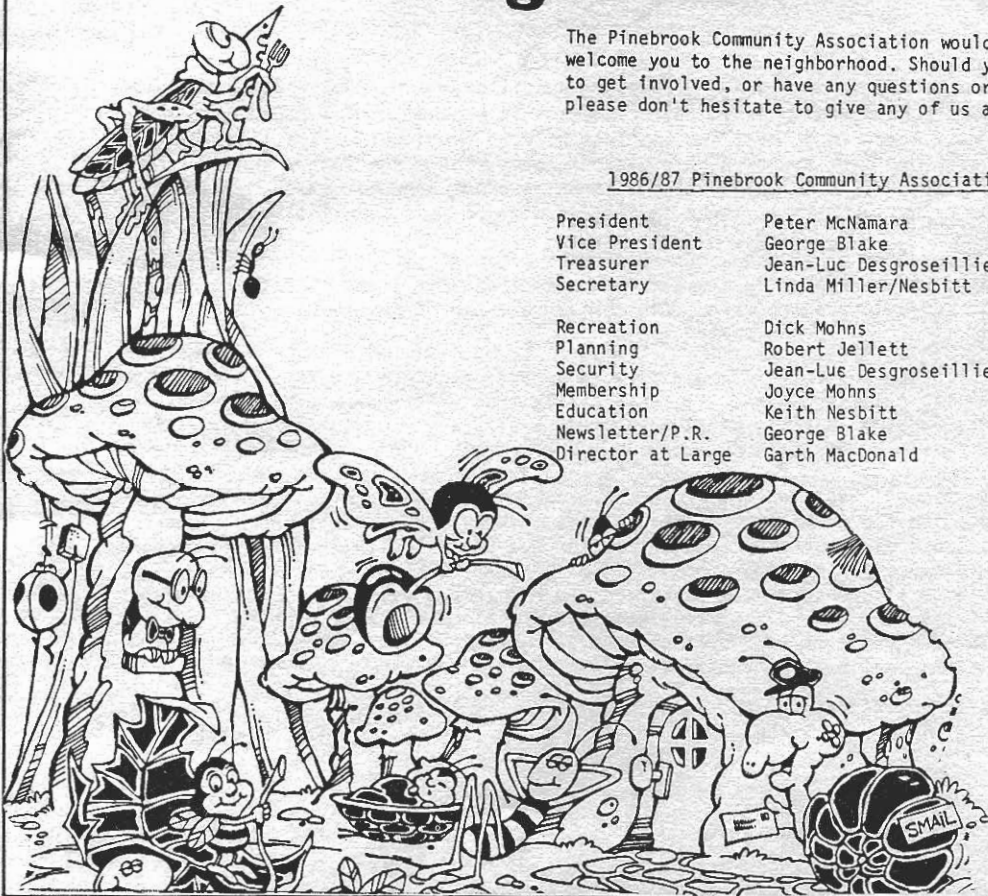

There are future needs, such as ice rinks, parks, and a community center, that have not been forgotten by Township Council. As resources permit, these facilities will be made available in Pinebrook.

A word of caution about the Water Management Area. Although this area is a most appealing and pleasant area for relaxation, when the water level is high it can become a very dangerous place for our children. Extra care should be exercised during spring run-off and after heavy rain periods.

As Mayfair 1986 Chairman, I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Pinebrook Community Association and all those people that volunteered their valuable time to make this event a success. It is hoped that next year, Mayfair can be expanded with events being held in Pinebrook.

Township Council was elected to work on behalf of all residents of our community. Take for example the discussion concerning the pathway behind Fallingbrook. Concerned residents of Brookridge Crescent approached Council with their valid concerns. After much discussion, with give and take on both sides, a decision was reached that was agreeable to all concerned. 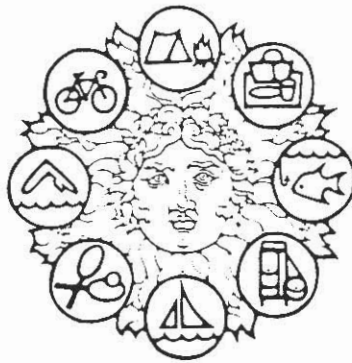

### GENERAL

TOT LOTS: In our last bulletin we mentioned that funding was received from the Township for two "TOT-LOTS" east of the 10th Line. The playground equipment has been selected and ordered and in fact has started to arrive. The site locations have been approved by Cumberland Township with one going on the upper edge of the stormwater management pond adjacent to Appollo Way at the east corner and the other going on the back edge (south end) of the small water-management pond adjacent to Princess Louise Drive immediately across from Place de Papillon. The architectural designs are currently being done and if all goes well the intention is to construct the playgrounds using self-help on three consecutive weekends in June, 14/15, 21/22 and 28/29. Anyone willing to help out can contact any member of the rec committee. Please consider lending a hand and the more the merrier.



FUTURE DEVELOPMENT: Approval in principle has been received from council to assist in developing a fully lighted high-board outdoor rink for operation next winter. The site tentatively selected is just off Bottriel Way north of the Timberly Condominiums, the sight that the proposed Sportsplex will eventually be built on. More info will be provided in future bulletins.

SCOUTS, CUBS, GUIDES and BROWNIES: The feasibility of our community sponsoring our own Scout and Guide program is currently being studied. Mr. Frank Townson, a local scouting coordinator, is investigating the interest in the Scout movement (see article in this issue). If there is someone interested in trying to stimulate interest in the other programs please contact the recreation committee. Keep an eye out for future information.

COMMUNITY SURVEY RESULTS: While there were no big surprises in the recreational results of the recent community survey, it is certainly apparent that the interests and desires of our residents vary considerably. There were essentially two questions on the survey on which I would like to report the results, the first listed several activities and asked if you would participate if a facility was available. There was interest in all areas but results supported the activities in the following priority:

The second question asked residents to prioritize the items our parks should consist of. The responses listed the items in the following priority

5. playing fields
6. wading pool
7. basketball courts

Other write-in suggestions included fitness trails, bike paths, outdoor pool, picnic tables and one enterprizing soul wants a golf course.

## MAIL DELIVERY

### Issue: "Green Box" vs Home Delivery

The results of the Community Survey made public at the Annual General Meeting of the Pinebrook Community Association on April 17, 1986 overwhelmingly gave the Pinebrook Community Association a clear mandate to take action against "Green Box" mail delivery. While 96% of the 400 households surveyed favoured door-to-door mail delivery, only 4% remained indifferent.

As a result of this response, an action group comprised of citizens from the Pineridge, Fallingbrook and RiverRidge areas have met to establish a plan of action to prevent the installation of "Community Mail Boxes" in this area.

So far, three petitions have been presented to the House of Commons by our Member of Parliament, Mr. Don Boudria. Presentations by Canada Post on the issue of Community Boxes were held at the Queenswood Heights Community Centre and at the Township Council Chambers. On both occasions the citizens present made it clear to Canada Post representatives, Mayor Clark and Council members that they strongly opposed the installation of "Community Mail Boxes".

More recently a letter of objection has been prepared on your behalf which is enclosed in the centre of this newsletter. Support your community by signing the letter and sending it to the Minister Responsible for Canada Post. You are reminded that you do not have to place a stamp on the envelope since your letter is going to a Member of Parliament. However, ensure that your envelope contains the complete mailing address:

In order for this letter to achieve its full impact, it would be appreciated if you could place it in the mail in the next few days after receiving your copy of the newsletter. You are also encouraged to write your own personal letter to the Minister expressing your dissatisfaction over this kind of mail service.

Representatives of this area will be meeting soon with representatives of other areas in Ottawa-Carleton who are faced with the same postal problem. The purpose of this meeting is to establish a common plan of action which would pool our resources with those of neighbouring communities into a more visible front. Further action being proposed will be relayed to you through this community's newsletter or the local media.

Again we seek your support in getting Canada Post to provide this and other communities affected with an equitable mail service. Protect your investment and defend your right for mail delivery at your door. Send your letters to the Minister and make copies for your friends and relatives: the "Community Mail Box" approach may also affect them in the future.

Should you have specific problems with the "Green Boxes" such as parcel pick-up, Priority Post deliveries, location of "Green Boxes", etc., please call the Honourable Michel Côté's office at 997-3530.

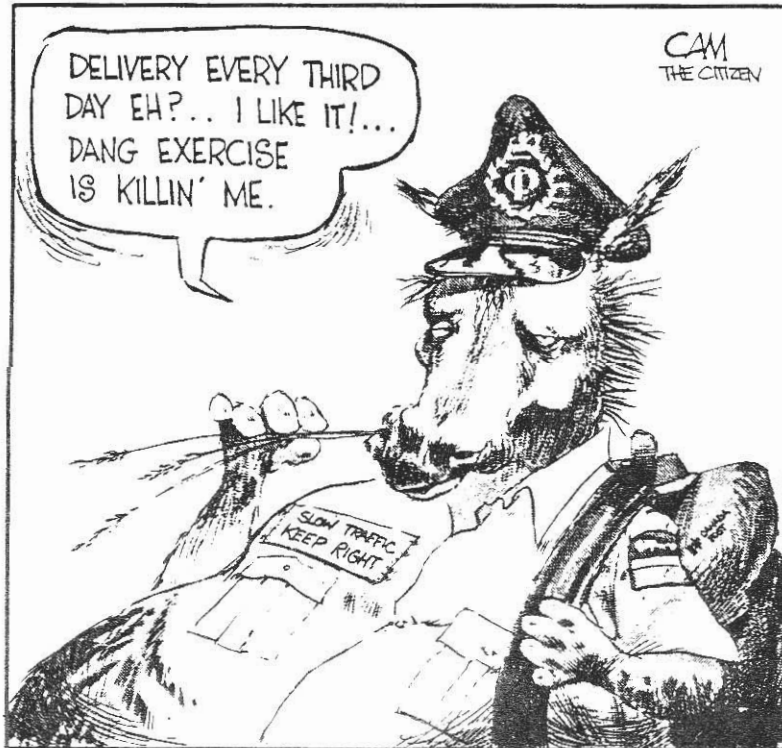


Dear Sir,

The residents of the Pine Ridge and Falling Brook areas currently have as a mailing address, Navan Ontario, despite the fact that we live in the community of Orleans. A survey conducted by our community association found that an overwhelming majority - 95% - feel this should be changed.

Those now living in the area east of the 10th line road do not ask for this change on a whim. All mail that is not General Delivery, (registered letters, parcels etc.), is sent to the Navan post office some ten kilometers away, when the Orleans postal sub station is close by. Another example arises when we look at the issue of Priority Post. There is no Priority Post service to Navan, but the Orleans area enjoys this service. This means that residents west of the 10th line are served, but those to the east have to drive ten kilometers to pick something up that costs the sender - who's paying for express service and not getting it - a great deal.

We have been told by John Fellows, the General Manager of Collection and Delivery, that this problem is easily rectified. The residents of our community certainly hope so, and await your reply.

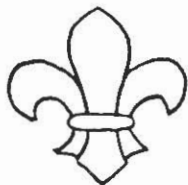

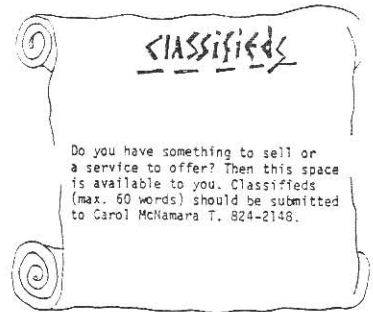

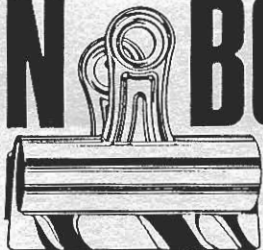
