It has been a quiet winter for the recreation committee with the only activities consisting of building and maintaining a small outside ice surface located just off Bottreill, north of Club Citadelle and the organization of a mixed broomball tourney as part of the Cumberland Township Icefest weekend.

Outdoor Rink - Despite the late start and very uncooperative weather, the outdoor ice surface off Bottreill was a huge success. It brought hours of enjoyment to many of the community's residents. We will plan to build it again next year as a low board fun rink in pretty well the same location. Many thanks to John Davies and Vince Costello for volunteering many hours of their own time to prepare, build and maintain this rink. It's the donation of effort by people like John and Vince that makes Fallingbrook such a vibrant and satisfying community. Thanks guys.

Princess Louise Park - Although no official information has been received from the Township with respect to the development of our first major park, the unofficial news is disheartening. Our park is apparently not top priority with the Township, meaning construction in 1987 is doubtful. Your Rec Committee will be forwarding a letter to the Township Recreation Committee emphasizing the critical immediate need for rec facilities to service our already substantial population (3,000 and growing rapidly). At a very minimum, we will strive to get the plans and money approved so grading can be done before next winter. I welcome your comments on this issue or better yet, contact our two councillors, Casey and Monette, for action. A conceptual drawing of this park will be on display at the Association's annual general meeting coming soon.

Icefest Broomball Tourney - Fallingbrook Recreation Committee organized another successful broomball tournament as part of the annual Icefest celebration this year. It was mighty chilly out there but nevertheless fun was had by all participants. Many thanks to Doris Lalonde and Wanda Thorsteinson for their efforts

in organizing this event.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT - Ball Players to Note

Mayfair - Fallingbrook has received a kind invitation from Queenswood Heights to participate in their Mayfair celebration again this year. Among other events we have been specifically asked to provide six teams in the Mayfair Slowpitch Tournament which will be held the week of May 25th to 31st or the following week of June 1st to 7th if the first week is rained out. As a former resident of Queenswood Heights and participant in this tourney, I can attest that it is a great time. Details are as follows:

Games will be played on Wednesday and Thursday nights and Saturday and Sunday. The rules and residency restrictions are:

Team participants must live on the same street, streets which intersect with one another or streets which run immediately parallel to one another (ie. the backyards are adjoining). One principal street must be identified for each team. The principal street will be the main selected street to which the requirements will apply. You must live within the boundaries of Fallingbrook community (ie. bounded by St. Joseph Boulevard, 10th Line Road, Innes Road, and Regional Road # 57). All participants must be 15 years of age or older.


Each team shall be required to have all players sign a waiver. The waiver for a minor (under the age of 18 at the time of the Mayfair tournament) must be signed by a parent or guardian. All such names on the registration/waiver form(s) will comprise the team roster. The roster may contain any number of players as desired.

Each team is responsible for providing their own equipment. Game balls and scorasheets will be provided by the organizing committee.

Note we can only enter six teams and its first come first served. Those interested please organize your street and notify any member of the Rec Committee of your interest. Additional information will then be forwarded to the team representative.

Conclusion - It is nearing the end of the term for the Community Association executive and as I will be stepping down as Chairman, I would encourage anyone with a keen interest in recreation affairs to come forward either to seek nomination as Chairperson or to be a member on the committee. Speak to any member of the committee if you're interested.

It promises to be an exciting time for the Rec Committee in the upcoming years and if you want to ensure that our community gets proper facilities there is no better means than by working on this committee. This is a beautiful community with incredible potential... come on out and help develop that potential to the fullest.

Dear Guy:

Although I have received nothing official concerning the status of our proposal for construction of a major community park in Fallingbrook, I am informed unofficially by members of the Township Recreation Committee that our park is not receiving top priority for 1987 and as a result construction this year is unlikely.

I find this very disheartening and view it as most unfair. As I pointed out in my presentation to the committee last fall, our community is now two years old with a current population of over 3,000 people, and growing rapidly. The demand for facilities from our residents is definitely justified. It is a little difficult to rationalize in my mind why a community of 1,000 people who already have a full range of facilities, would get a higher priority in order to refurbish an existing facility in view of the fact we have no facilities whatsoever.

I implore you to please have the Rec Committee reconsider their decision. I can't imagine this community going another two years without a recreation hall and sports facilities, which is exactly what will happen if we don't at least commence planning for Princess Louise Park this year. I would ask the committee that as a minimum they approve the initial planning and funding phase with a view to commence the grading late in 1987. This would then allow us to have an operational park by spring of 1988 which would be three years after the start of the community and consistent with Queenswood Ridge Park's schedule.

I look forward to hearing from you on this matter and trust this proposal will be looked at objectively. Thank you in advance.

EDUCATION

The Carleton Board of Education has bought the land for an elementary school in our district. The property is on the still undeveloped end of Princess Louise Drive, and is beside the proposed park in the space between Fallingbrook and Pineridge.

The concern now is not if - but when. Our School Board Trustee, Mr. Frank Cauley, has made presentations to the provincial government, and a tour and discussion with our MPP, Mr. Poirier took place a few days ago. It was pointed out that, even if there was no further growth, the expansion because of children entering the system would require Dunning Faubert to install a total of 15 portable classrooms. Growth in our community continues however, so it is obvious that expansion becomes almost unmanageable without a new school.

Provincial funding is required but is obviously hard to get. The magic of an election might help but we don't control the timing of that. Interested parents can however write our MPP, expressing our concern. A strong public appeal does have an affect.

Ministers of the Provincial government will be here to open a new school in Orleans and hopefully there will be an encouraging announcement at that time. If nothing is done soon we'll have portable classrooms in parking lots.

We'll be glad to give you information on household security, break and enter (B&E's) statistics in your area.....if you're organized. We can't make Neighbourhood Watch work as individuals.

Don't just acknowledge the existence of Neighbourhood Watch. Know how to recognize and react to strange or suspicious activities in your neighbourhood. Think about it. Can you really not afford to participate in a programme that asks for no money, so little of your time and offers a good, warm feeling of security around your home? Remember **April 25!**

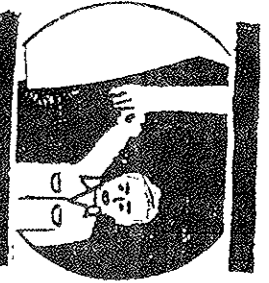

BLOCK PARENT PROGRAM

Many people do not understand the Block Parent Program, why it's there, what you have to do to become a Block Parent, what you do if you become one, etc. The following will perhaps help you to understand the program.

The Block Parent Program was developed to help children in distress, ie, a child gets seriously hurt, a child is being molested, etc. The home where a Block Parent sign is displayed is recognized as one where a child in distress can come for help.

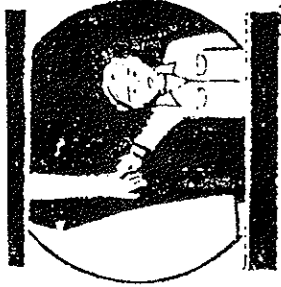
Basically how the system works is that you submit an application form to the OPP for consideration. They approve or reject it. As coordinator in the Fallingbrook area, I am advised of the approved applications and I contact the applicant(s) and arrange delivery of their sign and information kit as soon as possible. (Eventually, when Street Representatives are appointed, this will be done through them.) Ideally, each street should have a street representative. When a person moves out of the area, they are to return the sign to either the street representative or the Area Coordinator.

Some misconceptions that people have and to set the record straight:

- You don't have to stay home in order to become a Block Parent. In most families both husband and wife work (outside the home).
- You don't have to put up your sign if you don't want to be disturbed. (People do not automatically assume that no one is home if one day your sign is in the window and one day it's not.)
- Children are taught in school to recognize the Block Parent sign and that they will receive help there in an emergency. (I haven't heard of an abuse of the sign.)

I have slowly been contacting those who indicated in the Community Survey that they would like to become Block Parents and/or Street Representatives. If you've been missed, or you'd like more information on the Program or an application form, please call.

**LES PROGRAMMES DE SURVEILLANCE DE QUARTIERS
ET ECHEC AUX CRIMES**

Les responsables des programmes de surveillance de quartiers de la ville de Gloucester se sont réunis au quartier-général du service de police de cette ville le 23 février 1987. Des représentants de la canton de Cumberland (Queenswood Heights, Les Villages-Willowgate, Chateleine et Queenswood au nord de la route 17; et Fallingbrook) se sont invitées par Steve McGregor, président de l'association des coordinateurs de surveillance de quartier de Gloucester.

Le chef de police de cette municipalité, Lester Thompson, nous a assuré de son appui dans nos démarches au sein de nos communautés respectives pour faire un succès des programmes de surveillance de quartiers qui y existent. Le détachement de la sûreté provinciale de l'Ontario à Rockland poursuit une voie semblable pour les citoyens de la région de Cumberland. Le chef Thompson nous a expliqué que pour l'année 1986, il y a eu 37% de moins d'entrées par effraction que par le passé. Il nous a aussi mentionné que le taux de résolution des crimes commis dans cette municipalité est passé de 26% en 1985 à 36% en 1986 en nous indiquant qu'une aide accrue avait été reçue des citoyens.

Le constable Mark Cartwright, responsable de l'escouade des entrées par effraction de la police de Gloucester nous a avisé que les criminels retournent souvent dans les mêmes quartiers et qu'ils opèrent en général presque de la même manière que lors des crimes commis précédemment. Il nous invite aussi en tant que citoyens responsables à communiquer au service de police toute personne, tout véhicule ou toute action jugés suspects dans nos quartiers.

Le constable Andy Zmijewski, coordinateur des programmes de surveillance de quartiers, nous a pour sa part renseigné sur le programme "ECHEC AUX CRIMES" qui se veut un autre moyen d'aider les services de police de nos régions à résoudre les crimes commis et qui a depuis son apparition canadien à Calgary en 1982, donné des résultats tangibles.

Ce programme "ECHEC AUX CRIMES" a permis depuis son expansion à travers notre pays de retrouver une valeur de plus de 8\$ millions de marchandise qui avait été volée, de saisir des drogues pour un montant de plus de 31\$ millions, de résoudre 8683 crimes de tous les genres et d'effectuer 5769 arrestations relatives aux crimes commis. Les différents comités qui régissent ces programmes ont distribué plus de 500\$ mille de récompense.

Plus près de nous à Ottawa, "ECHEC AUX CRIMES" a permis aux policiers de retrouver plus de 600\$ mille de marchandise volée, de saisir 293\$ mille de drogues, d'élucider 547 crimes commis et d'arrêter 419 criminels. Les directeurs de ce programme ont de leur côté distribué 29.805\$ en récompense.

Il est à noter que le programme "ECHEC AUX CRIMES" n'a débuté dans notre capitale qu'en 1985 et que la collaboration des médias, du public et même des criminels a été excellente. Le chef de police et toute son équipe invitent tous les citoyens à ne pas hésiter à leur communiquer toute infraction dont ils peuvent être les témoins ainsi que toutes personnes suspectes qu'ils peuvent croiser dans leurs quartiers. Le service de police à Fallingbrook incluant les communautés du Club Citadelle de Timberley, Pineridge Glen de Pérez, Pineridge et Les Manors, est la détachement de la sûreté provinciale de l'Ontario à Rockland à 446-5124.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH CRIME STOPPERS

On February 24, 1987, a meeting of the Gloucester Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators Association was held at the Gloucester Police Headquarters. Representatives of the Township of Cumberland programme representing Queenswood Heights, The Villages (Willowgate, Chatelaine and Queenswood Villages north of Hwy 17) and Fallingbrook, were invited by Steve McGregor Chairman of the GNWCA.

Gloucester Police Chief Lester Thompson welcomed everyone and assured us of his support in promoting Neighbourhood Watch programmes within our communities and to make them a success. OPP Rockland has actively pursued a similar course for those in the Cumberland area. Chief Thompson went on to explain that in 1986, there were 37% less "break and enters (B&E's)" than in 1985. The rate of crime solved was 10% higher, climbing from 26 to 36%. This improvement is mainly due to the cumulative efforts of the citizens.

Constable Mark Cartwright of the Gloucester B&E squad stated that criminals come back very often to the same districts where they have been successful. Their way of operating rarely changes regardless of the area.

As responsible citizens we have to be aware of anything suspicious happening in our neighbourhood and we are invited not to hesitate in calling the police to give them a description of suspicious persons, vehicles and/or actions

Constable Andy Zmijewski, Gloucester Police coordinator for Neighbourhood Watch informed everyone about the Crime Stoppers Programme that is another tool for citizens to help police solve crimes. The Canadian programme first started in Calgary in 1982 and has since proven effective in solving difficult to solve crimes throughout Canada. In fact Crime Stoppers has helped recover over \$ 8 million in stolen property, produced over \$ 31 million in drug seizures, assisted police in making 5679 arrests and helped solve 8683 crimes since 1982.

In the greater Ottawa area Crime Stoppers has helped to recover over \$ 600 thousand worth of stolen property since March 1985. Drug seizures amounted to \$ 293 thousand. Crimes were solved in 547 cases and 419 criminals were arrested. The Board of Directors has awarded \$ 29,805 to citizens who provided key tips to the police in solving the crimes.

The assistance rendered by the media, the public and even the criminals themselves is judged to be excellent by the Gloucester Police. They invite any citizen who comes in contact with suspicious persons, cars or activities, not to hesitate to call the police. PROPOSED FALLINGBROOK COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

At the last executive meeting it was decided to present a new constitution to the membership. To this end, a by-law will be introduced at the annual general meeting proposing that the following constitution be adopted to replace our present one.

CONSTITUTION

March 1987

ARTICLE I Name

The name of the association shall be the Fallingbrook Community Association.

ARTICLE II Purpose

The purpose of the association is:

- 1) to promote the development of the community in accordance with the wishes of the membership.
- 2) to represent the membership before Council, the Municipal Office and its departments, and other bodies which affect the community.
- 3) to assist the Township and Council in identifying and developing the community in ways best suited to the needs of the population in the area.

ARTICLE III Boundaries

The boundaries of the community which this association represents are bordered by St. Joseph Blvd. on the North, 10th Line Road on the West, Innes Road on the South and Regional Road 57 on the east.

ARTICLE IV Membership

Full membership in the Association is open to all persons over 18 years on January 1, who have established permanent residency in the area as defined in Article III, and who pay annual membership dues per household as established from time to time by the executive committee.

ARTICLE V Officers

There shall be five elected officers, these being the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Past President.

V-a The President is responsible for the overall supervision and administration of the association, and insures that all policies of the membership and the Executive Committee are properly implemented. The President presides as Chairman at General Meetings and Executive Meetings. The President may appoint a moderator to act as chairman if he/she is so disposed. All formal representation on behalf of the Association to any external authority will only be made by the President or by a member designated by the President.

V-b The Vice-President fulfills the duties of the President if and when the President is unable to perform his/her duties of his/her office. The Vice-President is responsible for review and revision of the by-laws, liaise with other neighboring community association executives, as well as perform other duties as are assigned by the President and/or the Executive Committee, and to which he/she consents.

V-c The Secretary is responsible for general correspondence, the issuance of notice of meetings and the agenda, the preparation and maintenance of minutes of General Meetings and Executive Meetings, and such other duties assigned and agreed to by him/her.

V-d The Treasurer is responsible for the care and custody of all funds and other assets and for making payments of all approved expenses incurred by the Association. The Treasurer maintains books of accounts which shall be made available upon reasonable request. The Treasurer shall provide a financial statement at the time of the Annual General Meeting. The Treasurer, along with two other officers selected by the Executive Committee, shall be signing officers on all bank accounts of the Association. The Treasurer is responsible for the preparation of an annual budget for presentation at the AGM.

V-e At the end of his/her term in office, the President shall become the Past President and continue as an officer of the Association until replaced.

ARTICLE VI Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is composed of the above named officers, the Chairmen of Standing Committees, and any other member as agreed to by the officers. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for the administration of the affairs of the Association in accordance with the policies established by the membership at a General Meeting. The Executive Committee shall have the power to act on behalf of the Association prior to the approval of the membership, but it must report on each action and request ratification at its next General Meeting of the membership. Meetings of the Executive Committee are called by the President, who is Chairman. A quorum is at least one half of the members plus one. Notice of meetings is a minimum of 3 days, unless otherwise agreed to by all members. The Executive Committee shall endeavour to meet at least once a month.

ARTICLE VII General meetings

The general membership shall retain all powers of the Association except as designated in this Constitution.

At least 14 days notice must be given for a General Meeting, and an Agenda must be circulated as least 5 days before the meeting.

There shall be at least one Annual General Meeting open to full membership sometime between April 1 and June 30 each year.

Officers will be elected at the AGM and the membership will receive a financial report and a proposed budget.

General Meetings may be called by the President and/or the Executive Committee, or by a petition signed by at least eleven members of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII Elections

The executive Committee shall appoint a Nominations Chairman at least 30 days before the AGM. The Nominations Chairman shall not be eligible to hold office. The Nominations Chairman shall seek candidates for the positions of officers and shall declare to the AGM, all nominations which have agreed to run and duly seconded by a member. The Nominations Chairman shall assume the chair during elections and conduct the election. A candidate is elected when he/she receives an absolute majority of all votes cast. Each member carries one vote.

ARTICLE IX Committees

The Executive Committee has the right to appoint committees from time to time, and it shall provide terms of reference for such committees. Committees shall report to the Executive Committee and receive its approval before any expenditures can be undertaken.

ARTICLE X Finances

a. The financial year shall be April 1 - March 31.

b. Any changes in membership fees recommended by the Executive and presented in the budget shall be voted upon as a separate motion at a special general meeting.

c. All cheques must be signed by any two of the officers as designated by the Executive Committee.

d. The Association shall not incur debts or borrow money unless authorized to do so by at least two-thirds of the votes cast at a General Meeting, and provided a notice of motion to borrow is circulated with the agenda of such meeting.

e. All expenditures must be within the approved budget. Expenses not included in the budget and in excess of \$500.00 must be approved at a General Meeting.

No officer or member of a committee shall receive remuneration for duties performed on behalf of the association. Reasonable expenses incurred while performing specific duties however may be paid in accordance with the association's financial procedures.

ARTICLE XI Rules of order

"Procedures for Meetings and Organizations", by M.K. Kerr and H.W. King, Carswell Legal Publications, Toronto, 1984, or later editions, shall govern the organization in all procedural matters not otherwise covered by the constitution, by-laws or approved procedures of the Association.

ARTICLE XII Amendments to By-Laws

a. The by-laws of the association may be repealed or amended by approval of a motion receiving a two thirds majority of the votes cast at a general meeting, provided that a notice of motion affecting by-laws is circulated to the membership at least 14 days before the meeting.

b. In the event of dissolution, any assets of the association, after payment of liabilities, shall be turned over to the Township of Cumberland.

ARTICLE XIII These by-laws are approved by a motion of the general membership as identified by attendance at the General Meeting held on _____, 198_.

DOG AND CAT OWNERS

Welcome to all new homeowners and families to beautiful Fallingbrook in the Township of Cumberland. Fallingbrook is filled with excitement. A community to be proud of. The planning of parks, sidewalks and many other amenities is well underway and the future prospects are unlimited.

Many Cumberland residents may not realize that certain by-laws with respect to pets were instituted within recent years. These by-laws were designed to protect both investment in your property and parks as well as the health of your children.

Cat By-Law (2486)

This by-law prohibits cats from running at

large. Cats are not to roam, and must not encroach on another property other than that of their owners.

Dog By-law (20-85)

Dogs must be licensed with the Township and are not permitted to run at large.

Any person failing to comply can be fined from \$20 - \$50.

Stoop and Scoop By-law (63-83)

This by-law prohibits deposition of animal excrement (feces) anywhere in the Township other than on the animal owners property unless immediately removed.

Any person failing to comply can be fined from \$20 - \$100 for each offence.


These by-laws attempt to control some pet owners who act in irresponsible ways, by not cleaning up their animals excrements, which infringes on your rights and the health of your children. Whether you are a responsible pet owner or know of a FECAL FELONE your actions to ensure compliance with these by-laws is necessary to protect the life and future of your environment and investment.

FECAL FELONS are irresponsible pet owners who with premeditation, deliberately pollute our parks, sidewalks and gardens with excrement (FECAL material) in violation of Township by-laws (MORAL FELONY), by not immediately cleaning up the animal feces.

Perhaps the offensive odors of the parks and sidewalks in the spring will prompt you to remember the number of animals who used the parks and sidewalks as toilets during the winter.

ALL HOMEOWNERS SHOULD REPORT THOSE WHO DEBASE, POLLUTE AND ENDANGER YOUR HEALTH THROUGH THESE BY-LAW INFRACTIONS.
