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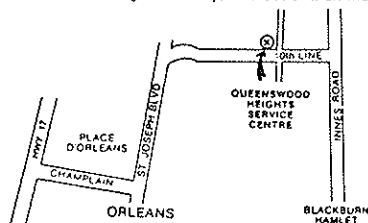

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Do I Live in Fallingbrook?

Yes you do! While each neighbourhood has been given a name by the developers (e.g. Pineridge, Garden Way, Ridgemont by the River, Fallingbrook) the entire urban community east of the Tenth Line is referred to and recognized by Cumberland Township as *Fallingbrook*. In a few years the developers' names will fade into memory, and only the name Fallingbrook will remain.

Why Fallingbrook, you ask? Why not the developers' names?

Fallingbrook is unique in that it is being developed over a very short period of time by many different developers. We do not have just one developer and hence one identity.

What's all the fuss about identity anyway?

Without an identity, or focus, community spirit and pride do not develop. Without a feeling of belonging, people don't want to get involved in their community. Without this feeling, Fallingbrook becomes little more than a bedroom suburb where the price of a home is right. (For the cynics among us, active communities have proven to demand higher housing prices.)

For community involvement to develop, a certain economy of scale is needed. Your community association is striving to develop this identity, this spirit, so as to make Fallingbrook "the" place in which to live, and the best place for our children to grow up in.

Why do we need volunteers?

Without volunteers, much of what we have and indeed expect would not exist. Imagine living in a community without any hockey, baseball or soccer, without outdoor rinks, tennis courts, festivals, special events, dances, scouting, Neighbourhood Watch, Block Parent program, without various service clubs... Without volunteers, none of the above would exist.

Why Fallingbrook?

Why the name Fallingbrook, you ask? Firstly, I think you will agree that the name is attractive and has some meaning. There are three beautiful falls along the escarpment, all accessible thanks to a network of public pathways. These are: the manmade falls we see going up Tenth Line hill; Princess Louise Falls located between Brookridge Crescent and Fallingbrook Ridge; and the third located east of Hautview Crescent.

The second reason for the choice is that it is the most recognized of the developers' names in this area, and was preferred by the majority of residents in a survey done over a year ago.

While some Fallingbrook signs have already been erected by the developer who owns the rights to the name, others are planned for the rest of the community when the interests of the developer diminish.

Let's make Fallingbrook "the" place to be.
Let's get involved together.

Exploring Fallingbrook



This column suggests short family outings in the Fallingbrook area, as a way of discovering our community.

Everyone who drives up 10th Line hill knows about the waterfall that can be seen there. But this is not the falling brook that inspired the name of our community, since this one is largely man made.

The real falling brook is farther east, and is not visible from St Joseph Blvd during the summer. It is part of Taylor Creek, which starts on the flats above the escarpment, and finds its way to the Ottawa River. As recently as 20 years ago, Taylor Creek was dammed up near the present location of the new Fallingbrook school inside Princess Louise, creating a small lake.

This waterfall is much more spectacular than the one near 10th Line, and is at its best during the spring runoff. It can be easily reached from Princess Louise Drive, where the water management structure is seen between Brookridge and Fallingbrook Court. There is a well maintained trail, part of the conservation land trail system maintained by the Township and by volunteers, which starts from here.

Only about 50 meters from the road, there is an overlook on top of the waterfall, which is protected by a railing, but watch your small children closely here, as it's a steep drop. There is also a wooden foot bridge across the gorge above this which leads east along the trail.

To get the best view of the falls, you must follow this trail to where it intersects an old dirt road which goes down the escarpment, onto St Joseph Blvd. Then come back west to the big dip in the road, where Taylor Creek passes under the road on its trip north. Or you can drive here instead.

Reaching the bottom of the waterfall is easy, and you get an excellent view of the water as it tumbles down the rock face. During the spring one can get wet from the spray when standing on the rock base directly underneath the falls.

Evidence of an old road can be seen between the falls and St Joseph Blvd. There is the remains of a concrete tunnel to pass Taylor Creek under this old road. There is also an old steel cable which is attached to trees, which served to protect the traffic of the time from going over the edge. At one place this cable is completely encircled by a tree, which may give some idea of how long it has been there. If anyone knows about this road, I would appreciate hearing about it.

Kids Discovery: A small metal tag is attached to this tree. The first five kids who tell me what is written on the tag will receive a prize.

Next issue: Exploring the "Fallingbrook Forest".

Tadpoles

My two year old son and I discovered a pond full of thousands of tadpoles. Go to the east end of Merkley Drive, go about 20 meters ahead towards the row of bushes, and then 100 meters to the right, to find the pond.

Patrick Francis and I took the "Proulx and Apollo Young Explorers" there to catch some tadpoles. The kids didn't get many tadpoles, but they sure brought home a lot of mud! The shore of the pond is almost like quicksand, so Pat and I spent most of our time pulling kids and boots out of the mud.

Perhaps by the time you read this, the tadpoles will have matured into young frogs.

Fireworks

The same Proulx and Apollo Young Explorers were delighted to be treated to an unofficial May 24 fireworks display by Barry Walsh and Pat Francis. Things like this add a lot to our community spirit.

Come Grow With Us

Cumberland Township is now the fourth largest municipality in Ottawa-Carleton, having recently passed the City of Kanata in size. We are behind Ottawa, Nepean and Gloucester. The East Urban Community (Orleans) has almost 50,000 people, almost twice that of the West Urban Community (Kanata).

Cumberland has a single representative on the 32 seat Regional Council, Mayor Peter Clark. Some would say he is the only representative for all of Orleans, since the Gloucester representatives seem rather uninterested in Orleans.

On Street Parking

Just a reminder of the laws regulating parking on the street. Parking during the day is limited to 3 hours, with no limit at night. During the winter, no overnight parking is permitted. For complaints regarding any municipal by-laws, call the Municipal Law Enforcement Officer during the day at 833-3090, or call the fire station administration number at 824-5777 outside of working hours.

Bicycling to Work

A number of hardy souls in our community bicycle to work. Some of them even go as far as downtown Ottawa. Although it is somewhat longer, there is a very pleasant off-road route near the river which avoids the very dangerous and narrow main thoroughfares.

The hardest part of the route is getting across the Queensway to Champlain and Jeanne d'Arc. Follow Jeanne d'Arc west to Orleans Blvd, and turn right there. Then take St Louis west, turn right on Hiawatha park and follow it to the end of the road.

You are now away from all automobile traffic, and are permitted to enjoy yourself. Follow the path through the Greenbelt to where it joins the Rockcliffe Parkway, which unfortunately was just opened to cars as I write this. This parkway now goes all the way to the Mile Circle, although there is still some construction going on with overpasses.

You can follow the Mile Circle all the way to Sussex if you wish, although some prefer to take a shortcut through Rockcliffe Village.

If you really dislike traffic, you can avoid the Jeanne d'Arc part by taking Decarie, going through the park, and crossing Bilberry Creek at the little bridge behind the apartments. This leads to a dirt road which eventually connects with Hiawatha Park.

Pssst..... have you Heard....

During the Membership Drive, many people expressed a desire to see a bit more polish on our public manners. Here's some of the areas of concern:

* Speeds on main entry streets (like Charlemagne, Princess Louise, Bottriel, Merkley, Apollo, Wilkie, etc..) One life is far more precious than that 1/2 minute it may take to slow down to the posted 40 KPH. And please, don't let familiarity breed carelessness at the intersections.

* If junk mail annoys you, don't stuff it in the "superbox", but ask Canada Post to install a waste receptacle at your mailbox.

And please, if you deliver flyers, please don't dump your extras beside someone's front steps!

* Pets & play in the Parks. For obvious reasons, archery and golf are prohibited on parklands (Bylaw 2300).

Congratulations to most pet owners in the community who consistently practise courtesy while exercising the pooch. They use walking leashes (especially important for an exuberant dog) and never leave filthy feces (even in foul weather), and their pet cats are never allowed to stray off home turf. (By-laws 86-87 and 24-86)

*Summer is the season for open windows! Your outdoor stereo may be sending a neighbour up the wall! Persistent barking (anytime) and machinery (11pm to 7am) will disturb many households. Should someone point out that your noise is a disturbance, try to be grateful that they had enough courage to talk to you rather than call a by-law Officer. It could save your reputation and your wallet (\$100-\$1000 fine under by-law 9-81)

* Street hockey may be a Canadian tradition, but it's a hazard and nuisance for motorists. Putting street manners into quick action as needed makes a lot of sense!

(P.S. Parents, remind your young explorers to avoid those dangerous construction sites).

It's the neighbourly courtesies that will help Fallingbrook maintain its friendly, charming atmosphere.

A NAVAN EMERGENCY

Picture this. Your brother and his family from out of town are visiting your family. This is the first time they have been to your new home. Your niece offers to babysit your kids, so the adults can go out for a Saturday evening performance at the NAC. You leave her the usual instructions and head out for the show.

Later on that evening one of your kids starts to choke on a snack. Your niece although panicky has the presence of mind to dial 911 for an ambulance. She asks the operator to send an ambulance to your address "in Navan". The operator asks if it is "Navan" or "Orleans". She says "Navan" because that's the address she uses when she mails you a Christmas card.

Are you willing to bet your child's life that the ambulance will be sent directly to your home rather than "via Navan"?

* * * * *

This is just an illustration of the type of dangerous situation that can arise if you do not use "Orleans" as your address. Why "Orleans"? Because nothing else describes where we live better! Not "Township of Cumberland" which is technically correct but confused with the village of Cumberland situated to the east of us. Not "Navan" which is our mail sortation point but is a distinct village situated 10k south of us. Not "East Urban Community" which Regional bureaucrats love but no one else knows what they mean. Not "Fallingbrook" which is merely a neighbourhood community identifier. Not Gloucester! Not Ottawa. Nothing else fits. When you tell people where you live don't you normally say "in Orleans"?

The confusion arose because Canada Post first told us to use "Navan" as our mailing address. What was intended as merely a postal station designator has been used to describe the municipality where we live. This is a natural tendency. We would rather refer to where we live by one name rather than many! Nevertheless, Canada Post decrees will not change the fact that we don't live in Navan. Let's look at it from another point of view. If our mail sortation point was moved to Rockland would we then use "Rockland" to describe where we live? Let's not perpetuate an annoying, confusing, and potentially dangerous situation by continuing to refer to where we live as "Navan". As Mr. Spock would say "It's not logical."

Canada Post has advised us to use Orleans along with our postal code as our address. Please, for all your subscriptions, accounts or other records change your address to "Orleans". Such changes are normally free for the asking. Yes they are a hassle. But if you ever need to use 911 service you will be glad you did.

911 WARNING!

The new 911 emergency phone system uses the mailing address that Bell Canada has in its computer. If this is "Navan" then emergency vehicles may possibly be mis-directed. There has been a recent incident where an ambulance was delayed for this reason.

The 911 people, the Township and the fire department, are aware of this problem, and are working towards a solution. In the meantime you are advised to do the following:

Check your Bell Canada bill. If the mailing address is "Navan", immediately phone Bell Canada at 564-4600 and have it changed to "Orleans".

- e) lack of schools
- f) lack of activities for teenagers

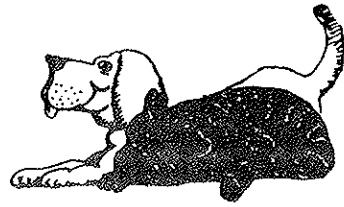

NOTICE TO DOG AND CAT OWNERS

According to By-Law 86-87, every person who allows or permits a dog to run-at-large in the municipality is guilty of an offence and li-

able to a fine. Under this same by-law, all dogs must be licensed with the Township.

D'après le Règlement 24-86, toute personne permettant à son chat d'errer ou de passer sur une propriété privée dans les secteurs résidentiels, ruraux ou urbains du Canton est coupable d'une infraction et passible d'une amende.

According to By-Law 24-86, every person who allows or permits a cat to run-at-large or trespass on property within the urban or residential areas of the Township is guilty of an offence and liable to a fine.

BY-LAWS

PUBLIC PARK USAGE

By-Law 2300 regulating the use of parks within the Township, states that except for casual play and unscheduled games that do not interfere with regular or authorized use, no person shall play or practice any game within any park or parkland except where provisions have been previously made by the Recreation Committee. All vehicles and off-road vehicles are prohibited. Parkland is an enhancement to life in our municipality, but the safety and privacy of its joint users must be preserved. Golf and archery practice are not permitted in parks within the Township and the Municipal By-Law Enforcement office seeks the residents' co-operation in using common sense and courtesy when using these public spaces.

LES REGLEMENTS

USAGE DES PARCS PUBLICS

Selon le Règlement 2300 sur l'usage des parcs du Canton, il est interdit de pratiquer ou de jouer un jeu dans un parc, sauf s'il s'agit d'un jeu fortuit et imprévu qui n'entrave aucunement l'usage normal, à moins d'obtenir au préalable une autorisation auprès du Comité des loisirs. Tout véhicule est interdit. Les parcs enrichissent la vie dans notre municipalité, mais nous devons respecter la sécurité et le désir d'être seul de ceux qui utilisent ces parcs. Le golf et le tir à l'arc sont également interdits dans les parcs du Canton, et le Bureau municipal chargé de l'application des lois demande aux résidents de bien vouloir coopérer en faisant preuve de bon sens et de courtoisie lorsqu'ils utilisent ces parcs publics.
