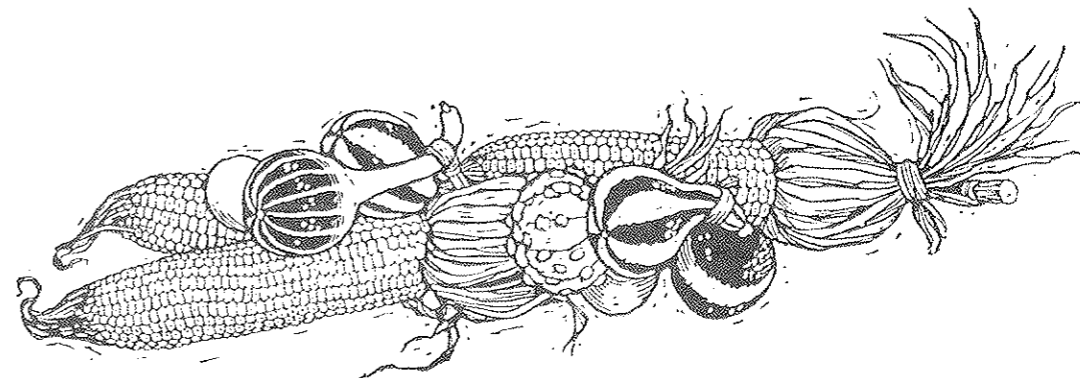

## Fallingbrook Loeb IGA Presents A Ray Friel Recreation Centre Update



### THE RAY FRIEL CENTRE FUND RAISING COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

There is good news and bad news. The construction currently happening on the 10th Line Road, unfortunately is not the Ray Friel Centre. The good news is that it is the new Sir Wilfred Laurier High School which will be annexed to the Centre. The school will provide the Township with its new Library and it will provide the centre with meeting rooms, a triple gymnasium, and sports fields. So really there is no bad news.

Construction on the Centre will start in the spring and phase One (The Pool) will be completed by Christmas 1991. The steel for the Centre has been ordered. It will take at least another three months before it is delivered. Rather than start this fall and pay the expensive heating and other costs associated with winter construction, it has been decided to wait until the spring before breaking ground.

The Ray Friel Fund Raising Committee has as its mandate to raise money for the fit up of the pool. The Committee wishes to upgrade the basic amenities and provide for such items as the wave machine, slides, diving boards, trophy cases, and pool decor - to name but a few. Without these items we will have just another centre, but with Community support and involvement we will have a facility that is unique and special.

The Committee needs your support and involvement. The Committee continues to plan and conduct special activities to raise money, but the money does not come unless the community supports these events and assists with new ideas and gets actively involved in making our sports centre truly one to be proud of.

I would be pleased to discuss your ideas at any time.

On behalf of the Committee, I would like to thank the Fallingbrook Community Association and the Fallingbrook Recreation Association for their continued commitment to the Fund Raising Campaign.

## Community News

### Tenth Line Road

Plans for the north phase of Tenth Line Road reconstruction received some criticism from affected residents. Those on the west side, in Queenswood Heights, objected to the road being too close to their property lines. Some residents on Norview in Fallingbrook objected to the suggestion that the present Tenth Line Road up the hill would be kept open for one-way traffic southbound.

We have been asking for years that the whole interchange at Highway 17 be shifted eastward to avoid these problems, but land acquisition has progressed too far now. We were particularly concerned about the high accident rate predicted at the corner of the new Tenth Line and St Joseph Blvd, where afternoon rush hour traffic would have to make a double-lane left hand turn up a hill facing into the sun. Keeping the present road open for this traffic would probably save lives.

The affected residents should make their objections known at the next open house held by the Regional Municipality to show the proposed plans. Watch your local newspapers for the meeting date. Now is the time to object.

### Lines on Charlemagne

At our request the Township has painted lane markings on Charlemagne. This should simplify getting on and off and make the intersections a bit safer.

Also at our request, the Township is looking into pedestrian crossing aids on Charlemagne at Bottriel, Princess Louise and Waters. Pedestrian crosswalks are not considered safe any more (although one has been proposed for Princess Louise). Either conventional traffic signals or some sort of pedestrian activated signal are more likely.

### Prepare Your Grass For Winter

New residents of Fallingbrook should be aware of the problems caused by field mice (voles, really) to your grass and trees during the winter. This is a particular problem in the newer areas near open fields. The mice like to eat the grass right down to the roots to make nests, and they like to eat the bark off the bottoms of trees and bushes.

You should cut your grass very short in the late fall, and rake up any clippings. Trees and bushes should have their bottom 18 inches wrapped in plastic spiral or burlap. If they do eat your grass, it will grow back; but if they manage to ring your tree, it may be too late.

Also remember to turn off your outside water tap from the inside cutoff, open the little drain plug, and open the outside valve. The hose bibs the builders put in are supposed to be self-draining and frost-proof, but they are often installed slanting up instead of down so they don't drain, and may crack during the winter.

## Rezoning our Future: The Fight For Waterfront Lands

As summer fades into fall, the Township of Cumberland is embroiled in a head-on fight with the residents of Chatelaine Village over the rezoning of a prize tract of land north of Highway 17, bounded by Trim road, the Ottawa River and Chatelaine Village. The Township and most Councillors (Bob Monette dissenting) voted to first modify the Official Plan and then rezone a choice piece of land owned by PEREZ -BRAMALEA, to allow for high and medium density residential construction. Prior to this amendment, referred to by staff and Council as "the Perez-Bramalea amendment", the parcel of land was designated Urban Waterfront, Open Space, and Recreational Commercial. No residential development was allowed. Now, against the recommendation of the Township's own staff report, several thousand units of residential housing will be permitted, adding to road congestion and restricting the availability of prime real estate for office development in the longer term: development much needed to ensure sufficient levels of local employment and ease demands on commuter arteries.

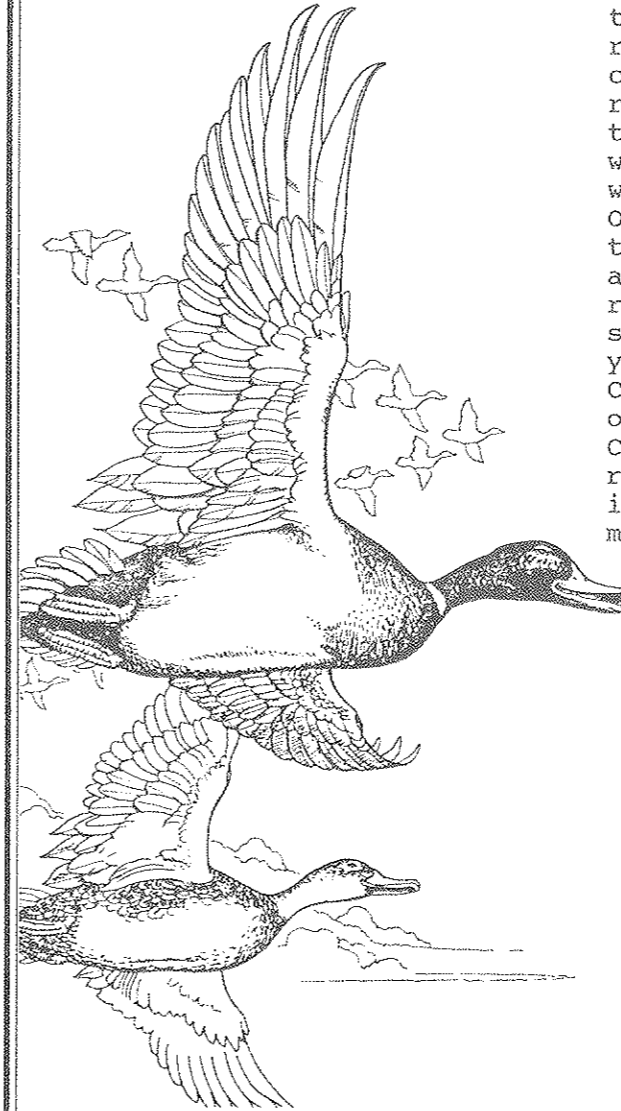
Our neighbours in Chatelaine Village plan to appeal this matter to the Ontario Municipal Board, which has the authority to overturn Council's decision. The outcome ultimately affects all residents of the Township, and especially urban commuters. Can citizens fight city hall and win? I hope so, because there appears to be no other viable defence in Cumberland against elected officials placing, what is in my opinion the short term economic advantage of vested interests like Perez over the vital long term interests of the public whom they are paid to serve. Win or lose, it is high time that the present Council recognized its responsibilities to the electorate in the urban sector of Cumberland, even though we are badly outgunned at the Council table.

## Commissioner to Review Ward System

Commissioner Katherine Graham has been appointed to redraw the electoral map for Regional Council, and local Council as well. The Fallingbrook Community Association has advocated the creation of additional regional council seats to better represent the Orleans area as a whole, and the reduction and redistribution of Cumberland council seats to better represent the urban area through population - based wards on an accountable "one ward/ one councillor" basis. Our preferred option calls for the creation of 4 urban wards and the retention of a single rural ward to reflect the shift in population. In a few years, more than 80% of Cumberland will be comprised of urban residents. Commissioner Graham's recommendations are slated for implementation in next year's municipal elections.

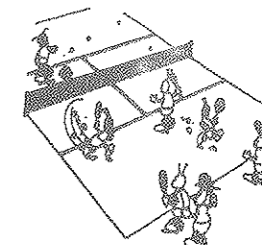
## KIDS TENNIS CLINIC A HUGE SUCCESS!

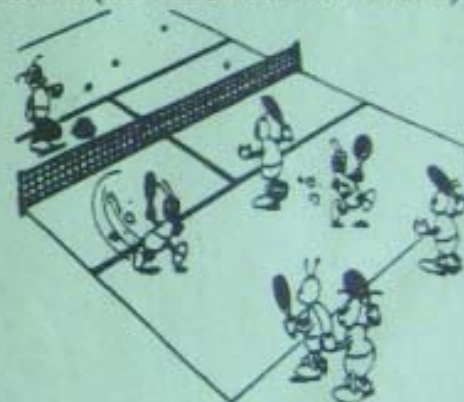
