## A Message from your Community Association

It's important to keep in mind that no other level of government affects our daily lives more than the local level. It affects your fire and police services, transportation, education, recreation services (everything from parks to what programs you can participate in), street maintenance, snow removal, water, sewer, garbage collection, etc.

With all this in mind, it's somewhat surprising that fewer than 60% of the electorate go out and vote. In these difficult economic times it's more important than ever to get involved, be informed and to exercise our right to vote.

The following issues have been identified by you and your community association over the past few years. We invite you to take the time to consider these and other issues when choosing your candidate.

- **Development vs. Infrastructure Woes** - Development has been allowed to continue despite much of the infrastructure not being in place (transportation, schools, parks etc..) In these tough economic times, how will your elected representative go about ensuring infrastructure and development go hand in hand so that we don't have overcrowded schools, or a transportation system that is inadequate for existing needs (let alone for approved future growth).
- **Who should politicians represent** - Situations often arise that polarize constituents on different sides of an issue. How do we ensure politicians make the right decisions and not the easy decisions? What actions do you expect your elected representative to take to ensure that we have all the facts and that they know what the will of the majority is.
- **Local Community Centre** - The township has been collecting lot levies for a community centre in Fallingbrook for some time now. With development almost completed, one wonders if the township really intends on building such a facility in Fallingbrook and if so, where and when? (While the Ray Friel Centre is greatly appreciated, it should be kept in mind that this is a township wide facility and not a local community centre similar to the ones in Queenswood Heights, Chatelaine Village, Navan or Cumberland)

- **Intensification and the lack of open spaces** - In these tough economic times, residential intensification is on the rise. Fallingbrook has a minimum of park land and open spaces when compared to many other communities (Chapel Hill, Queenswood Heights). How can we maximize what we have? There are also insufficient sports fields for the number of children who sign up for soccer, softball, etc. Is it time for Cumberland to build a large municipal park just outside the urban area? One that could have lighted fields and enough parking so that neighbors wouldn't be disturbed.
- **Bridge to Quebec** - Will this proposal really help our local economy, or just increase the congestion on the Queensway? What action will be undertaken to ensure that the electorate is kept informed of the planned development before it takes place?
- **Teenagers** - While the vast majority of teenagers are very responsible, a few are into vandalism and theft. What can be done about this increasing problem? What strategy does your elected representative have? How will they go about ensuring results and not just talk?
- **Recent Municipal Raises** - Most of us have had our salaries frozen for some time now. Council on the other hand recently voted themselves raises. In the case of the mayor, despite a decrease in workload (because of regional reform), council approved a 27% raise (from \$59,000 to \$75,000). This brings the salary of the mayor of Cumberland to within a few thousand of the mayor of Ottawa's salary. How do you feel given that the mayor of Kanata (a similar sized municipality with similar issues) will only make \$59,000?

All the local municipal and regional candidates were provided with a draft copy of the issues outlined above along with an invitation to address the electorate in our newsletter (because of space limitations we were not able to provide space for school trustees). All but two (Jeff Leiper in Cumberland Ward C2 and Keith De Cruz in Regional Ward 1) submitted responses. By ward and in alphabetical order here is what they have to say.

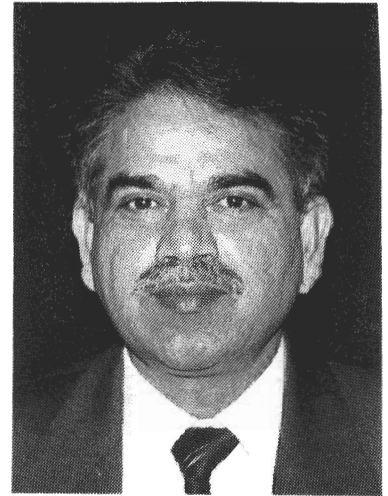

Development vs Infrastructure- I would propose, that a dialogue be set up with all concerned parties, to implement any planning and insure all the infrastructure would be in place and developed as the community is being built.

Local Community Centre- It is in my opinion, that the Ray Feil Centre is ideal for the township, but it is not affordable to all the tax payers nor is it accessible to all. I would work toward the establishment of local Community Centres.

Who should the politicians represent- The tax payers of course. To establish a good working neighbourhood, it is not easy to satisfy everyone and all concerns should be weighed by the decisions made by council. This can be achieved by listening to each and every comment made on the issues at hand before a final decision is made.

Recent Municipal Raises- I would propose, the raises be rescinded.

Intensification and the lack of open spaces- I would support the building of a park with all facilities required to support community sports and the family as long as it is made affordable to all.

Bridge to Quebec- In my opinion, a bridge would only increase traffic on the access roads to Ottawa and help develop cheaper housing on the Quebec side of the river.

Teenagers- I think, if the community centres were affordable and available to teenagers, there would still be problems, but they must have some place to hang out with their friends.

NOTE:

It must be understood, if an increase in community services is an urgent requirement, taxes may have to increase in order to pay for these facilities. I will not see taxes be increased for the municipality unless it would serve all residents equally.

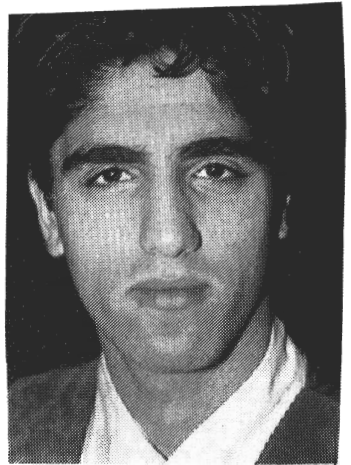

# Herb KRELING

As a resident of Fallingbrook since 1989, I share your concerns affecting our neighbourhood and Regional Ward 1. Community policing, transportation, planning, and open government are a few of the topics that you have discussed with me in our recent visits. Ten years experience as a Municipal Clerk and Administrator, in addition to five years involvement in our community affairs through the Community Association (past president and vice-president), provides me with the experience necessary to work on your behalf as we address these issues and continue to build our families' futures together.

**POLICING:** Regional reform introduces region wide policing. After the amalgamation of the cities' police services, negotiations with other municipalities will extend police service throughout the region. As a father of two daughters I am committed to pursuing community policing initiatives that will keep our streets and neighbourhoods safe. As a former police commission secretary, I am familiar with policing issues and their associated costs. The advent of regional policing gives us the opportunity to benefit from region wide services while at the same time extending community policing initiatives. This can be done through local precinct or store front operations that will maintain police officers presence in our neighbourhoods and foster a positive relationship the residents.

**OPEN GOVERNMENT:** As taxpayers, we have a right to know how and why our tax dollars are being spent. Keeping everyone well informed is the key element to restoring confidence in our system of government.

**TAXATION:** We are all aware of the impact that our property tax bill has on our household budget. In recent years, regional taxes have been held to increases that were less than inflation. Now is the time to freeze taxes.

**SOCIAL SERVICES:** The total Orleans population is about 80,000, yet despite the dedicated efforts of the citizens' Health Care Planning Group, senior government funding for the proposed clinic has been cut. It is necessary that this concept be pursued at the Regional and Provincial levels so that we have prompt and cost effective health services for our families.

**TRANSPORTATION:** With the expansion of the east urban community south of Innes Road the demands on transportation will increase. It is imperative that the transit corridor and road improvements along Innes Road and Highway 17 keep in step with this development. Our east/west transit and road connections are vital to our community.

We all share a stake in our community. We have all chosen Fallingbrook as our home. As your Regional Councillor for Ward 1, I commit to working with you and on your behalf to meet your needs and the needs of future residents. (Questions? Please call me 834-HERB (834-4372).

I would like to thank the Fallingbrook Community Association for this opportunity to address the community, and also to thank the Association for their continuing efforts to create a better quality of life for our citizens.

There are many issues of concern to be addressed, but whether we are talking about increasing crime, vandalism, and violence, salaries for our elected representatives, green spaces, economic and land development or even a new bridge, these issues can be easily resolved by taking advantage of scientifically validated programs which directly address the underlying cause of many of our problems. Programs currently in place have not been effective because they have not addressed the problems holistically through a comprehensive approach. For example, crime prevention can not be restricted to the approaches of target-hardening and community watch programs when the crime epidemic is due to the accumulation of stress in collective consciousness. Stress can be dissolved through an approach which some analysts have called the "field effect of consciousness".

Another regional responsibility is that of health protection, disease prevention and promotion of healthier lifestyles. Our current health care crisis compels us to encourage people to take more individual initiative for their own health care through learning prevention oriented techniques. It is irresponsible for governments to allow people to fall sick and then spend thousands of dollars a day to care for them when there are proven methods capable of reducing disease by 50% or more.

An important area of city and regional planning is land use. Communities that are too densely constructed are cramping to the human spirit and become a direct cause for the buildup of stress that leads to crime and ill health. Green spaces, bodies of water and beautiful natural settings are essential to the quality of life and should be preserved.

I advocate devolving as much authority to the regional and municipal levels as possible and would work towards transferring power and resources, including the economy from the federal and provincial levels. Specifically, I would establish a permanent local council of business leaders to monitor any potential problems in the local economy and develop a plan to create as many jobs as necessary to revitalize the economy. Since the most important and untapped economic resource is the unlimited creative potential of our citizens, I would emphasize this development through educational programs that have been shown to develop the inner creative genius of every individual.

Having worked in the field of education for the last 20 years, I have personally witnessed the potential of many programs which have been scientifically documented to increase intelligence, improve academic and work performance, and improve the ability to organize and effectively use information. It harms our community and our nation immeasurably not to take advantage of them.

It is time the public demanded that government implement techniques and programs that have been proven to reduce stress and improve the quality of life for the individual and the whole society. As citizens who are concerned with the well-being and progress of your family and your community I urge you to investigate these viable alternatives and to assist me in making them readily available, so that the problems that plague our community will not continue to grow.

As Senior Management Consultant and Regional Director of Human Resources for DIAND, I was responsible for cost/benefits analysis of economic development projects, local government reviews, long-range planning, etc.

During the recent review of O-C regional government, I prepared a comprehensive position paper on the need to maximize the use of our collective municipal resources, and met with the Commissioner to discuss the matter in detail.
