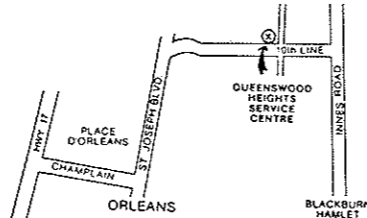

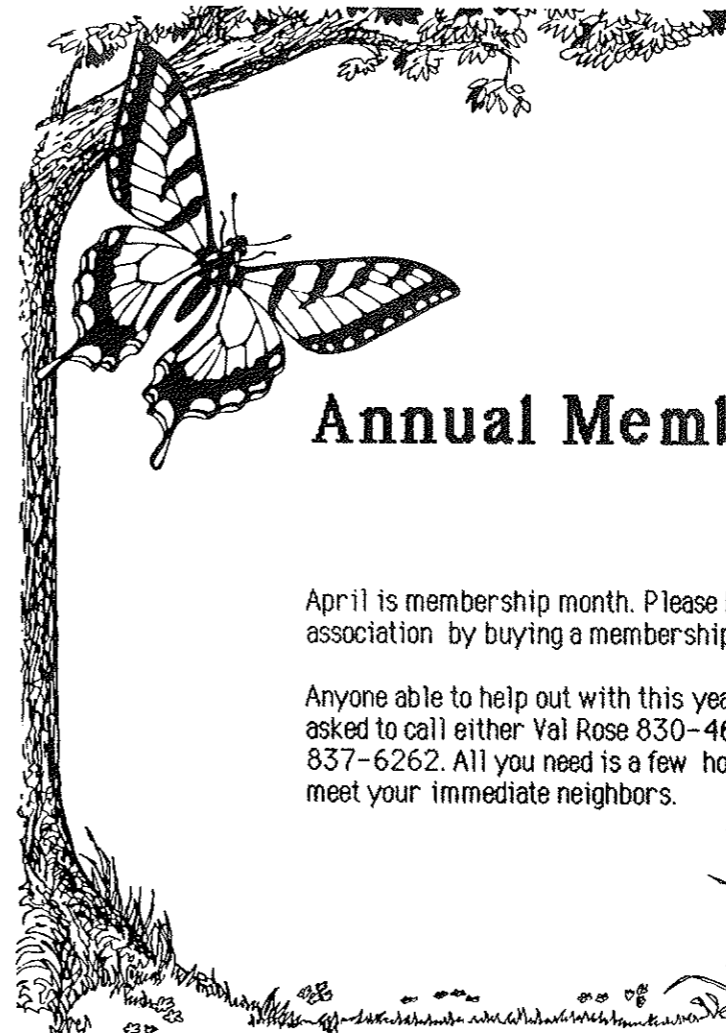

PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

Meeting with Jean Poirier

The Fallingbrook and Queenswood Heights Community Associations had a very useful meeting with our MPP, Jean Poirier, last month. We heard that a small ambulatory care hospital is coming close to fruition, to go near Regional Road 57 and Highway 17. Mr Poirier has also lobbied hard to get a high school for Fallingbrook, although we won't hear until April.

We discussed our concerns about the Queensway, and Mr Poirier explained some of the difficulties involved. He also expressed his support for studying the boundary issue in Orleans, concerning the creation of a City of Orléans.

New Schools Sprouting Up

Construction on the K-8 largely French immersion school inside Princess Louise Drive is progressing well, and things are looking good for both the school and the adjoining park to be ready for September. The overwhelming choice for the name of the school is *Fallingbrook Elementary School*, and we have passed this suggestion on to Frank Cauley, our CBE trustee.

It is less clear if the Des Pionniers school at Wilkie and Merkeley will be ready for September. The CSSB has also started the design of an English elementary school to go at Charlemagne and Watters Road, along with an associated park; the CSSB wants construction to start in June.

Roads, Roads...

Anyone who drives west in the morning knows that the road situation in Orleans is bad. The population has increased here well beyond the point where the Regional Official

Plan said transportation must be improved before any further development. Yet development continues.

This is the only part of the region where the transportation system is operating beyond its capacity. There is excess capacity towards the south, yet the region is now pushing for the Alta Vista Parkway to service the South Urban Community.

The Regional Official Plan has for years recognized the need to improve the roads to Orleans. St Joseph is supposed to be four lanes wide. So is Innes, which is supposed to bypass Blackburn Hamlet. The Queensway needs to be 6 lanes wide west of Jeanne d'Arc. The Eastern Parkway needs to be built to Tenth Line Road.

Part of the problem is that we must deal with four levels of government, each of which can blame the others. The province feels that they are not responsible for providing regional transportation, and ask why the region is not improving its roads. The region has been held up by squabbling over the Blackburn bypass. The Champlain interchange has been set back a year because Gloucester has not started its part of the Ring Road. The NCC refuses to consider an Eastern Parkway through the Greenbelt.

Which brings us to the next topic.

Towards a City of Orléans

The movement towards a separate City of Orléans is growing. Gerald Dust, a lawyer from Chapel Hill, has unveiled *Orleans '89*, an organization which he hopes will see the new city formed by 1989.

Sidney Marinoff, a Fallingbrook native, will complete his study of this issue by April. He has received funding to perform an extensive telephone survey of the opinions of residents from across Orleans. So if a caller identifies him or herself as being from the Car-

leton University School of Public Administration, please answer the questions thoughtfully. This survey, performed in a legitimate academic fashion, may provide the evidence of "broad support" which is required to convince the province to act.

Jean Poirier, our MPP, is quite supportive of studying this issue. He has stated that if there is strong public support for a City of Orléans, he will approach the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

There is also some support from the Cumberland Council. Where the support is lacking is from the Gloucester politicians, who obviously have the most to lose. Oddly, some of the most vocal supporters for a separate city come from Gloucester.

Visiting the Deputy Minister

George Blake, the president of the Fallingbrook Community Association, traveled to Toronto with MPP Jean Poirier, to meet with the Deputy Minister of Transportation and Communications, regarding our objections to the design of the Tenth Line interchange on the Queensway.

George had a lengthy meeting, and presented our brief. Our basic concern was that putting the eastbound off-ramp beyond Tenth Line, and then bringing the traffic back westward on St Joseph, would result in 30 accidents per year at the intersection of Tenth Line and St Joseph alone.

Reducing the length of the weaving section on the Queensway from 650 to 450 meters would obviate the need for two intersections, with a considerable improvement in safety. A political override is needed, since the highway designers were only concerned with maintaining freeway standards, without considering the regional road safety aspects.

Although the deputy minister was non-committal, Mr Poirier felt that the mere fact

the meeting was arranged is promising.

Canada Post Again

In our December newsletter we published a letter from *Canada Post*, stating that we could use the address *Orleans* instead of *Navan* provided that we used the proper postal code.

However the ever-vigilant staff at the post office have apparently been scratching out the name *Orleans* and writing in *Navan* again (all for 37 cents). If you have received such mail, please keep the envelope and send it to us.

Using Prestone Hill?

With the new light at Tenth Line and Tompkins-Charlemagne, a lot of people are now using Prestone Drive to get to and from the core. Prestone is a local collector road for Queenswood Heights; we should be using Tenth Line, which is a regional arterial road.

There have been complaints from Queenswood Heights residents about the increased traffic. This problem will resolve itself when the Queensway interchange at Tenth Line is constructed, but unfortunately that is years in the future.

There is a possibility that the Township will add impediments to motorists using Prestone, such as stop signs and no-turn signs. I have suggested instead to the mayor that the traffic signal cycle at Tenth Line be adjusted to give a long wait to those crossing Tenth Line, particularly at rush hour.

No one benefits from such impediments, so please use Tenth Line hill, not Prestone hill.

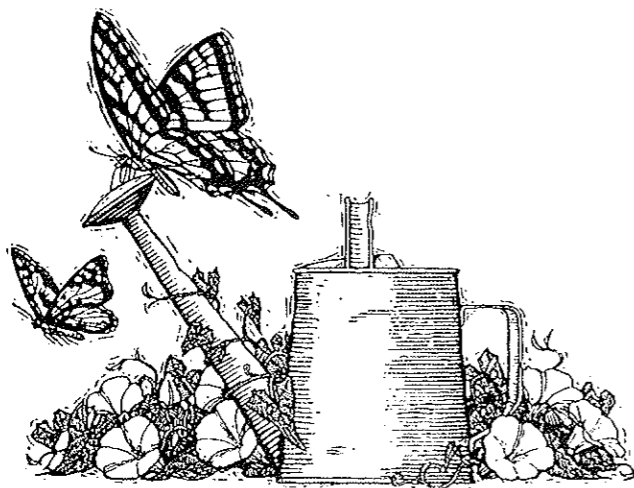


Busy Building in Fallingbrook

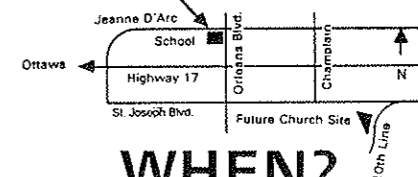

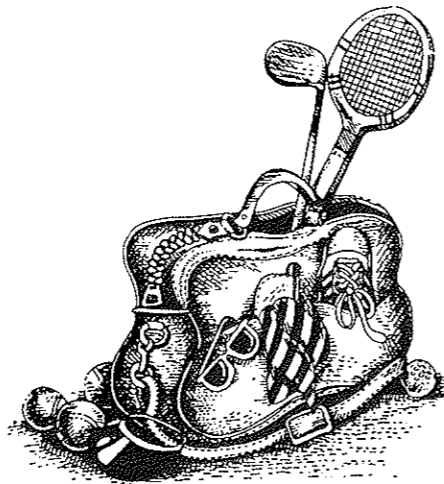

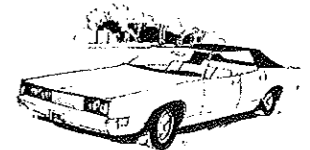
